Write developed answers. Support your ideas with reasons, examples, or a personal experience.

1. Why did you choose your current car, or why would you choose one?

2. Do you consider yourself a good driver? Why or why not?

3. At what age, if any, should people stop driving?

4. What is the best thing about having a car?

5. What is the worst thing about having a car?

6. If you could buy any car in the world, which would you choose?

7. When will driverless cars become more common than manually driven cars?

8. What will cars look like in one hundred years?

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Possible B2 answers: Notice how each response gives a clear idea and support.

1. Why did you choose your current car, or why would you choose one?

Example: I chose my current car because it is reliable, economical and suitable for daily life. I would prioritise safety and running costs over an expensive design.

2. Do you consider yourself a good driver? Why or why not?

Example: I am a careful driver because I try to anticipate other people's mistakes and avoid using my phone. However, every driver can improve through regular practice.

3. At what age, if any, should people stop driving?

Example: People should stop driving when health problems seriously affect their vision, reaction time or judgement. Regular assessments may be fairer than one fixed age limit.

4. What is the best thing about having a car?

Example: A car gives people independence, especially in places where public transport is limited. It can make commuting, shopping and visiting relatives much easier.

5. What is the worst thing about having a car?

Example: The worst aspects are the cost, traffic congestion and environmental impact. Owning a car can also be stressful when repairs or parking are difficult.

6. If you could buy any car in the world, which would you choose?

Example: I would choose a safe electric car with a long battery range and a simple, comfortable interior. I would rather have practical technology than a luxury sports car.

7. When will driverless cars become more common than manually driven cars?

Example: Driverless cars may become common within a few decades, but full adoption will depend on public trust, laws and whether the technology works safely in every situation.

8. What will cars look like in one hundred years?

Example: Cars may be electric, largely automated and designed to share road space with cyclists and public transport. Some may become smaller because cities have limited space.
