Write developed answers. Support your ideas with reasons, examples, or a personal experience.

1. Have you ever seen a celebrity in person? What did you do?

2. Which famous person would you like to meet, and what would you do together?

3. Do famous people have a right to a private life?

4. Which celebrity do you admire, and why?

5. Are most celebrities good role models for young people?

6. Would you like to be famous?

7. What is the quickest way to become a celebrity today?

8. Do famous people have a responsibility to help society?

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Possible B2 answers: Notice how each response gives a clear idea and support.

1. Have you ever seen a celebrity in person? What did you do?

Example: I have not had a memorable celebrity encounter, but I would try to behave normally and respect their personal space. Being recognised everywhere must be exhausting.

2. Which famous person would you like to meet, and what would you do together?

Example: I would like to meet someone whose work has changed public thinking. I would ask about their creative process and how they cope with criticism.

3. Do famous people have a right to a private life?

Example: Famous people clearly have a right to privacy. Public interest does not justify reporting every detail of their family life or private relationships.

4. Which celebrity do you admire, and why?

Example: I admire celebrities who use their influence carefully and continue to work seriously in their field. Popularity alone is not a reason to respect someone.

5. Are most celebrities good role models for young people?

Example: Some celebrities can be positive role models, but young people should not copy every aspect of a famous person's lifestyle. Media images are often carefully managed.

6. Would you like to be famous?

Example: I would not enjoy constant attention or the loss of privacy. I would prefer my work to be recognised without becoming personally famous.

7. What is the quickest way to become a celebrity today?

Example: Social media can make someone famous quickly, especially through viral content. However, quick fame is often unstable and does not always reflect real ability.

8. Do famous people have a responsibility to help society?

Example: They have no greater legal duty than anyone else, but their influence gives them an opportunity to support useful causes. What matters is whether their involvement is sincere.
