Write developed answers. Support your ideas with reasons, examples, or a personal experience.

1. What habits or substances can people become addicted to, and why?

2. Should alcohol and tobacco be illegal? Why or why not?

3. Should cannabis be legal for medical or recreational use?

4. Why do some people use illegal drugs?

5. Why are some drugs legal while others are illegal?

6. At what age should people be allowed to buy alcohol?

7. Should drug users face strong punishments, or should they receive help?

8. How can alcohol affect people's behaviour?

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Possible B2 answers: Notice how each response gives a clear idea and support.

1. What habits or substances can people become addicted to, and why?

Example: People can become addicted to substances, gambling, social media or shopping because these behaviours may offer temporary relief from stress. The underlying causes are often complex.

2. Should alcohol and tobacco be illegal? Why or why not?

Example: I would regulate alcohol and tobacco very strictly rather than make them completely illegal. Bans can create illegal markets, while taxes, education and treatment can reduce harm.

3. Should cannabis be legal for medical or recreational use?

Example: Medical cannabis may be appropriate when doctors prescribe it carefully. Recreational use is more difficult because laws must balance personal freedom with public-health risks.

4. Why do some people use illegal drugs?

Example: Some people use drugs because of stress, trauma, curiosity or social pressure. Others may believe substances will help them escape problems that need longer-term support.

5. Why are some drugs legal while others are illegal?

Example: Legal status often reflects history, culture and politics as well as medical evidence. It is not always a simple measure of how harmful a substance is.

6. At what age should people be allowed to buy alcohol?

Example: The legal age should be high enough to protect developing brains, but the exact number depends on evidence and local culture. Education should begin well before that age.

7. Should drug users face strong punishments, or should they receive help?

Example: Treatment and prevention are usually more effective than punishment alone, especially for addiction. Serious trafficking is different because it can harm many people.

8. How can alcohol affect people's behaviour?

Example: Alcohol can reduce self-control and make people more emotional, aggressive or careless. The effect varies, but it is never an excuse for harmful behaviour.
