1. Do you think your country's future will improve? Why?

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Possible B2 answers: Notice how each response gives a clear idea and support.

1. Do you think your country's future will improve? Why?

Example: I think my country can improve if it invests in education, housing and sustainable infrastructure. Progress is possible, but it requires long-term planning.

2. What worries do you have about the near future?

Example: I worry about rising living costs and environmental change. These issues feel large, but practical action is still more useful than constant anxiety.

3. What are your long-term plans?

Example: My long-term plans include developing useful skills and maintaining strong relationships. I prefer goals that are flexible enough to adapt to unexpected changes.

4. Which film best represents your idea of the future?

Example: I prefer films that show the future as complex rather than simply better or worse. Technology may solve some problems while creating new ethical questions.

5. Will people ever build a time machine?

Example: A time machine is unlikely because it would create serious scientific and logical problems. However, new discoveries often make today's assumptions seem limited.

6. Do you think your best days are still ahead of you?

Example: I hope my best days are ahead because there is always more to learn and contribute. A positive future requires effort as well as optimism.

7. What future invention would you like to see now?

Example: I would like affordable clean-energy technology that works reliably in every climate. It could reduce costs and environmental damage at the same time.

8. What changes do you expect in your country next year?

Example: I expect gradual changes in work, transport and digital services. The most visible changes may come from how people respond to economic pressures.
